5) PASCOMMUCK CONSERVATION TRUST OPENS MUTTER'S FIELD ACCESSIBLE NATURE TRAIL IN EASTHAMPTON - DRONE VIDEO TOUR

Pascommuck Conservation Trust completed the 1800-foot Mutter's Field Accessible Nature Trail in Easthampton this past August. The trail accommodates members of the general public with strollers as well as those with mobility challenges. Additionally the trail features an accessible picnic area, an improved stream crossing and improved access to the property via handicap accessible parking. It is ecologically non-invasive. Next up, Pascommuck plans to add interpretive signs and restore a 2-acre meadow along this accessible trail.

6) LAND & WATER CONSERVATION FUND COALITION SIGN-ON LETTER

With Congress now back in session and opening statements starting on the Energy Bill Conference Committee a few weeks ago, a major push on a new Land & Water Conservation Fund support sign-on letter is essential. Since permanent authorization of the LWCF passed the Senate, but not the House, it is going to be on a shorter list of issues that MUST be addressed before the end of this Congress. It is part of the Energy Bill Conference Committee right now, but it could also be included on any other legislative vehicle that is moving at the end of the Congressional session - such as an Omnibus funding bill or other large package that comes together after the election. 7) ELM NEEDS SUPPORT FOR FY18 GREEN BUDGET

As you know, Massachusetts environmental agencies have seen substantial funding and staff cuts in recent years. At the same time, responsibilities are growing. Agencies like DCR and DEP are having a hard time fulfilling their missions. ELM has been leading a collaborative effort to gather material for the FY18 Green Budget, which will advocate for funding for key programs and highlight specific needs and opportunities.

ELM is seeking to grow the Green Budget Coalition to 85 member organizations so they can speak powerfully with a unified voice about statewide environmental funding needs.

20) MASSWILDLIFE ANNOUNCES \$300,000 IN HABITAT MANAGEMENT GRANTSNovember 15th deadline

For the second year in a row MassWildlife is awarding grants to support private and municipal efforts to manage conservation lands for the benefit of wildlife. The goal of the MassWildlife Habitat Management Grant Program is to provide financial assistance to private and municipal landowners of conserved lands to support active habitat management and expand public recreation on these lands. The program also aims to improve habitat for game species, to manage habitat for Species of Greatest Conservation Need as identified in the State Wildlife Action Plan (with special emphasis on State-Endangered and State-Threatened Species), and to expand public recreational opportunities for hunting, fishing, trapping, and other wildlife-associated activities on conserved lands.
