6) Comments Needed for Clean Water Rule Repeal

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has been ordered by President Trump to repeal the Waters of the U.S. Rule, also known as the Clean Water Rule, which defines which wetlands and waterways are protected under the Clean Water Act. EPA has opened a 30-day public comment period on the repeal and we need your help to submit as many comments as possible telling EPA to keep the Rule intact. 7) Governor Baker Signs Fiscal Year 2018 Budget - What It Means for the Environment

On July 17, Governor Charlie Baker <u>signed the Fiscal Year 2018 budget into law</u>, a \$39.4 billion plan. This spring, the budget passed by the Massachusetts House proposed allocating \$222M to environmental agencies (EOEEA, DEP, DCR, DFG, MDAR). Following that, the Senate budget proposed to allocate \$224M, so one might have imagined that the compromise budget would have landed somewhere in the middle, around \$223M. However, that's not the case, given the funding gap Massachusetts is experiencing between projected and actual revenues. **So, instead of \$223M, environmental agencies will get just \$218.6M**. 26) How Your Land Trust Can Participate in the Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Program to Promote Nature-Based Solutions

In September 2016, Governor Baker established the Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Program (MVP) through Executive Order 569, and it has already awarded over \$1 million in funding to 20% of the municipalities in the Commonwealth to undergo a stakeholder-based planning process called Community Resilience Building (CRB). Through CRB, in each community, a core team performs a climate change vulnerability assessment and designs an adaptation/resiliency plan with the help of a larger advisory team over the course of two workshops led by trained service providers. Communities that develop plans through CRB receive favorable consideration for state conservation funding. There are four components of the MVP program in which local land trust can participate in the process and promote nature-based solutions. Land trusts in communities which received MVP awards should consider contacting their local officials to explore opportunities to get involved.

There will be a presentation at the September 15th MLTC Member Meeting.

27) Back to School Shopping Comes with Big Waste of Energy - Do Your Part to Make a Difference!

Back-to-School shopping season has begun. Stores are attracting customers with big sales and open doors — but during hot days with the air conditioning running, these open doors waste a lot of energy. Each open-door store pollutes the atmosphere with over 2 tons of CO2 over the summer. If stores across the country closed their doors in the summer, it would reduce the amount of pollution generated by cars driving 830 million miles - every year.

Generation 180 is a national non-profit committed to advancing a cultural shift in energy awareness and clean energy adoption. To help empower consumers to make a difference, they have created the Keep It Cool campaign to decrease retail energy waste nationwide. Participating in Keep It Cool is easy. When consumers notice a store wasting energy with open doors or conserving energy with closed doors, they share the store location with Generation 180 using Facebook Messenger.
