## Nature Groupie Extension Fellowship: A Case Study for Internship Collaboration








- Funded by private charitable donations to UNH Extension
- UNH Extension recruits and hires students
- Partners apply for interns for 2-week stewardship and citizen science projects
- Student(s) conduct 4-5 field projects during 10-week summer internship
- Partners gain stewardship capacity, engagement with students
- Students gain job experience, a living wage, and introduction to local organizations and real-world conservation issues






#### Successful User: Conservation Commissions

- Townsend Conservation Commission
- Squannacook River Clean-Up Events → reoccurring throughout Summer 2017
- Clear river for canoes and restore wildlife habitat




### SERVICE LEARNING FRAMEWORK

- Typically one to three months, can be longer in some cases.
   May have a hourly component. Think semester time frame
- Generally a one time experience, but can be more
- Typically unpaid but costs often picked up
- Usually part of an educational program- credit bearing class
- Distinguished from volunteer experience by established intentional learning goals/objectives
- Promotes educational, personal and professional development
- Focus matching a project with the course objectives for particular class that meets the community partner's need

### HOW DO YOU KNOW WHEN YOU ARE READY TO PARTNER WITH A COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY

- 1. You have time to think and plan for a project.
- 2. The primary goals of your organization are met.
- 3. You have an available willing staff member to serve as a mentor/ supervisor/content person
- 4. You have the basic resources need to support the additional help or project. ...."um, we need a map of the property"



# TOP 3 REASONS <u>NOT</u> TO PARTNER WITH AN COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY

- 1. Funding was cut and you need free labor in order for your organization to function or to get basic functions done.
- 2. You need it now!...like within a couple of weeks
- 3. We need the free labor to get the job done and students will easily do the job with little oversight by me

Other reasons?

#### GETTING STARTED

Step 1: Set Goals

- What does your organization hope to gain from the partnership?
- Are you looking for additional help on a project?
- Are you growing quick and needing new talent?
- Are you a non-profit that doesn't have a lot of money but can provide a meaningful and rewarding experience?
- Are you looking to introduce land conservation to emerging professionals?

## Working with college students can be like herding sheep



### STARTING AN SERVICE LEARNING PARTNERSHIP

#### Step 2: Write a Plan

- Identify and analyze needs within your organization
- Determine the scale, scope and appropriateness of how students could help meet those needs. (Specific project, day-to-day support, research, etc.)
- Draft a project description

#### STEP 2 CONTINUED

- What sort of academic background do you want in an student/class
- Who will have the primary responsibility for supervising the class/student?
- What will the they be doing?
- Will you provide training opportunities outside of the project itself?
- What is your time frame for completion? What is their timeline for academic work? Must match

### ESTABLISHING A COMMUNITY BASED LEARNING PROGRAM

#### Step 3: Recruiting Partners

- How will you find college partners connections?
- Start early!
- Develop relationship with local CBL-Service Learning resources.
- Take a look at college's course offerings and who is instructing them. Contact directly
- Social media sites, college websites, professional organizations, college/university CBL-Service Learning Office

### PARTNERSHIP REMINDERS

 Choose your Partners Carefully. Make it work for you and the student/class

- Seek written plan/documentation of the agreement. Not an absolute, but helps establish professional connection
- Have all the contact information in place. Phone, email, other numbers for all college connections



## STEP 4: MANAGE THE STUDENTS

- First few beginning days are defining days
- Provide clear expectations
- Provide orientation
- Provide resources needed to do the job
- Check in on the students. Find out their schedule
- Give lots of feedback
- Evaluate performance every few weeks

### TOP 10 CONCERNS OF STUDENTS

- 1. Give us Real Work.
- 2. Do what you say, and say what you do.
- 3. We like feedback.
- 4. We want to be included.
- 5. Please Explain.
- 6. I want a mentor
- 7. A minute of your time, please.
- 8. Be prepared.
- 9. Um...I need a chair.
- 10. Trust me to do the job

- Certification of Completion/Appreciation/ Recognition
- Letter of Recommendation

- Complete required college paperwork- evaluation
- Public presentation
- Newsletter profiles
- Provide closure
