Re: Reimbursements for MassWildlife for free and discounted licenses in FY25 state budget

Dear Honorable Members of the FY25 Budget Conference Committee,

Our organizations are grateful for your leadership in supporting the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife (MassWildlife). We work closely with experts at MassWildlife to protect and restore rare, threatened, and endangered species throughout the Commonwealth, including urban wildlife habitat. Critical habitat has always faced threats from development, fragmentation, pollution, and invasive species, and now climate change is heavily impacting ecosystems and natural areas, making MassWildlife's work more important than ever.

MassWildlife is primarily funded through the sale of hunting, freshwater fishing, and trapping licenses, permits, and stamps, as well as dedicated federal funds from the Wildlife and Sport Fish Restoration program. Despite this dedicated funding, MassWildlife is chronically underfunded and receives minimal support from the General Fund.

We have been grateful for the Legislature's support for budget language (line item 2300-0100) in the last three consecutive budgets to reimburse the Inland Fish and Game Fund for the loss of revenue associated with free hunting, fishing, and trapping licenses statutorily offered to residents over age 70, minors, and disabled residents, worth more than \$1 million per year² (see attached fact sheet for more information). This budget language created

consistency with an existing law that requires the state to reimburse MassWildlife for *discounted* licenses for those ages 65-69. ³ However, the same provision was not included in the Governor's FY25 budget.

We respectfully request that the Conference Committee include the language adopted by the Senate (through Amendment #2, filed by Senator Moore) to again reimburse the Inland Fisheries and Game Fund in the FY25 Operating Budget for both free and discounted licenses.
