# DCS Grant Programs

**Conservation Partnership** – Grants for <u>land trusts</u> to protect conservation land


Land and Water Conservation Fund – Grants for municipalities or state agencies to pursue conservation and recreation projects

**PARC Grant Program** – Grants for <u>municipalities</u> to protect recreation land and/or develop new or renovate existing parks

**LAND Grant Program** – Grants for <u>municipalities</u> to protect conservation land

**Drinking Water Supply Protection** – Grants for municipal water supplier/water districts to protect public water supply lands

Landscape Partnership – Grants for large-scale conservation projects submitted by 2+ partners (including <u>municipalities</u>, state agencies).

# DCS Grant Priorities

- Landscape protection
- Biodiversity and natural resource protection
- Working lands
- Expansion of recreational opportunities
- Location in Environmental Justice neighborhood
- Climate resiliency

### Conservation Partnership Grant Program

#### Eligible projects:

- Land acquisition for conservation and recreation
- Due diligence expenses for gifts
- Fee simple or CR projects are eligible
- Eligible entities are 501(c)(3) non-profits with environmental, conservation, or recreation purpose

# Conservation Partnership Grant Program Requirements

- Convey a CR to municipal or state agency or land trust
- Must retain an interest in the property – applicant cannot be used as a pass through
- Land must have public access and benefit
- Conservation and recreational use only

# Conservation Partnership Grant Program Information

- Maximum grant award is \$175,000
- Reimbursement rate is 50% of total cost

### Land and Water Conservation Fund Grant Program


- Federal money from the National Park Service
- DCS administers the program for Massachusetts
- Can fund recreation, conservation, and trail projects

## LWCF Grant Program Requirements

- Reimbursement rate is up to 50%
- Maximum grant award \$1 million, minimum \$50,000
- Projects must also be approved by the NPS

### PARC Grant Program

Eligible projects:

- Purchase parkland
- Develop new public outdoor recreation facilities
- Renovate
  existing
  municipal public
  parks



### PARC Grant Program Requirements

Applicant must have an approved Open Space and Recreation Plan

Any city regardless of size or town with a population of 35,000 or more is eligible for maximum grant award amount

Towns smaller than 35,000 may apply under the "small town," "regional," or "statewide" category

Must have an authorized park/recreation commission and conservation commission


Land must be dedicated to public park purposes and under custody of Park or Recreation Commission or Park Department

# PARC Grant Program Information

- Public should participate in project selection and design
- State assistance ranges from 52 to 70% of total project cost
- Project must have municipal vote that authorizes application, raises/ borrows/appropriates total project cost (not just local share), and dedicates land to recreation purposes
- Maximum grant award is \$500,000



# LAND Grant Program

- Purchase land or CR for natural resource protection
   & passive outdoor recreation.
- Maximum grant award is \$500,000
- State assistance ranges from52 to 70% of total projectcost

# LAND Grant Program Requirements


Applicant must have an approved Open Space and Recreation Plan

Must have votes to authorize conservation or agricultural commission to apply, hold land, and secure project cost.

Public access must be provided for passive recreational use.

Land is permanently protected under Article 97

CPA funding is an eligible source of funding, a CR will need to be recorded as condition of reimbursement.



### DWSP Grant Program Information

- Purchase of land or CR for drinking water supply protection, conservation and recreation
- Maximum grant award is \$350,000
- Reimbursement rate is 60% of total project cost.

### DWSP Grant Program Requirements

Property must be located in a Drinking Water Supply Protection zone, or an area designated for anticipated future water supply use

DEP public hearing and approval required (award indicates preliminary approval)

Vote by Board of Water Commissioners (or Board of Selectmen authorized as such) to authorize purchase for water quality protection, and to secure project cost.

Public access for site appropriate passive recreation where acceptable.

Land is permanently protected under Article 97

CPA funding is an eligible source of funding, a CR will need to be recorded as condition of reimbursement.

### Landscape Partnership Grant Program Requirements

- -Maximum award: \$1,250,000
- -50% reimbursement rate
- Eligible for funding:
  - Fee acquisition
  - CR/APR/WPR
  - Park/playground for small communities
  - Due diligence for gifts contributed as part of eligible projects

### Landscape Partnership Grant Program


#### Eligible projects:

 Contiguous landscapes, or parcels connected through protected land, that meet minimum acreage threshold (100-500 acres min.)

#### AND

- 2+ applicants from the following:
  - Municipality
  - Land trust
  - State/federal land agency

# Conservation Assistance for Small Communities Grant Program

- For towns with <7,000 residents</p>
- Will reimburse: \$5,000/appraisal,\$15,000 for OSRP or \$6,000 for other plans
- -80% reimbursement rate
- Non-competitive, rolling closes on May 5!
- Reimbursement contingent upon grant application (not award)

### Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) Action Grant Program

- Grant round to open soon! Closes May 2023
- Open to MVP communities
- Up to \$3M per project, \$5 million for regional projects (Average grant size last round was ~\$450,000)
- Projects completed by 6/30/2024 or 6/30/2025
- Reimburse 75% of total project cost (90% for communities meeting definition of "Massachusetts economically disadvantaged rural communities.")

# Services Land Trusts Can Offer Municipalities

- Primary liaison with landowner
- Negotiate sale price, draft & hold contracts, make deposits
- Due Diligence: title exam, survey, appraisal, environmental
- Facilitate municipal & state approvals
- Grant-writing
- Pre-acquisition to keep municipalities eligible for state grants
- Hold CPA-required CR
- Baseline Report





# Keys to Successful Municipal Partnerships

- A strong municipal partner at the staff or committee level
- Understand the municipal approval process (who needs to know first?)
- Build trust
  - Be available
  - Be a pleasant squeaky wheel
  - Follow through
- Communicate, communicate, communicate
  - Clearly explain process (provide timeline / steps to finish)
  - Status updates
  - Keep partners on schedule
